

Irene Angelico's documentary film Dark Jullabies is a present  
tense touching movie that explores the impact of the holocaust on  
the post - war generation of Jews and Germans. In order to  
present this, she traveled to Palestine, Germany and based  
the movie on the personal life of her mother and father, and  
the effect of the holocaust on other people she met. Irene's  
style of filmmaking allows the audience feel what the post-  
war generation are feeling. The film captures the almost  
true history of the holocaust. Only the people who partici-  
pated in it really know the truth. The film deals with child-  
ren of survivors and how they were never told about the horr-  
ible happening in Germany until later in their lives by someone  
else. Irene captures the unfortunate happenings of the inno-  
cent people and the horrible fates they faced. With the  
personal experiences of Irene and her family, the film becomes  
even more touching.

The opening scene of black and white photographs of a  
young man and lady in separate pictures parallels the fact  
that the couple was once separated during the horrible  
holocaust. The audience becomes aware that the couple  
shown are the parents of Irene Angelico. The film becomes  
very personal from this point. After a long period of time,  
the couple is fortunately reunited. The couple soon left  
Germany after their daughter was born and headed to America.  
Black and white film of people, young and old, in concentra-

tion camps display their destruction and captivity. Kids with burnt numbers in their left arms are seen rolling up their shirts to show the camera man. Those numbers are not removable, ~~as like~~ <sup>Nor are</sup> the memories that went along with them. A photograph of Irene and her dog grows smaller until it is just an image on a black background with the title, Dark Lullabies appear <sup>in</sup> white. ~~in~~ This introduction of what happened to her parents leads the film into its purpose.

Irene has lost everyone, everything and especially, the hope of life. The Holocaust is too painful to discuss. That is why children of survivors are so distant from their parents. Angelico allows the audience experience what she is feeling by the scenes of people being cruelly beaten. ~~who show~~ <sup>this</sup> what could have happened to her parents.

When the people are taken into the concentration camps, their citizenship is taken away. Their name is taken away and their identity is destroyed and replaced by a set of numbers. A question, very common among children of survivors, is "What are they supposed to do about the people who killed their grandparents, parents, aunts and uncles?" No one can tell them what to do. A close - up of Irene's trembling hands and frustrated face demonstrates this point. From this question, Irene decided to commence a search knowing that it would be futile, but she had to look. The children of survivors come together to assist each other with

their questions. Irene is shown attending a so - called meeting in Montreal.

The killings were deliberate acts of murder; people were taken off the face of the earth. The children of the survivors <sup>were</sup> really child survivors. They were left with many unanswered questions.

At the end of the war, people celebrated while the Jews mourned. When it was all over, they left Germany for good and went to Palestine. These events are represented by black and white film of Jewish refugees crowded on a ship that took them away forever. The movie takes the audience to Palestine. By travelling there, it makes it more realistic to the viewer. While she was there, she met many child survivors and survivors themselves. The film shows the unhappiness and the uncomfortable times of a couple of people. One man was a survivor who had lost his wife. A lady was looking for her family.

In the next scenes, the audience is introduced to a wife and daughter of a man who died in the concentration camps (of after). The daughter tells her story. To show her image of the Holocaust that she had been told of she painted images on a wall. They <sup>who?</sup> do not understand why. By filming this family so closely, the audience becomes a part of them; they imagine what they went through. I know I was feeling very emotional while watching Dark Lullabies.

The following scene takes us to a survivor's home. He tells his story of what happened to him and his family. The man takes care of <sup>vorous and</sup> birds, pigeons. He sees birds caged up, but eventually let out. This parallels the people who were locked away in the concentration camps, but when they were let out they were let out to die. Birds symbolize peace and freedom. Well, it is ironic to see a free bird caged up like the innocent people who were locked away from the world. The man who has the birds learns the meaning of life while taking care of the beautiful creatures.

The title of the film comes from the lullaby, "Lila Lila" which mothers used to sing to their children. By definition, a lullaby is a song to quiet babes or lull them to sleep, but in the film they are dark lullabies. They were dark probably because the mother was feeling the after effect of the Holocaust. Ark could also represent the hurt, pain and bad memories of a horrible event.

Germany is the setting for the rest of the film. While in Germany, Irene talks to people <sup>54.) whose</sup> whose relatives were part of the Nazi organization and how they, the second generation, like the Jews were not told about what happened. They, both sides, were deprived of their history. At this point in the film, we see both sides of the event in history. The biggest stop of all, visiting the camp where her father was, is shown in the next scenes. We see Irene's curiosity and nervous-

neces at the sametime while she is travelling on a train to  
Dachau. The audience sees her walking through the camp gates  
and stroll slowly towards the barracks; the viewer can see the  
proud and strong person of Irene from the distance, but he  
does not witness what she is feeling. The closing scene has  
Irene standing outside her home where she was born and where  
her father had gain<sup>ed</sup> a reason to live again. It is hard  
to begin again with all those uneraseable memories lingering.
